
Our Year 10 members then attended their Model UN conference hosted by the American School in London last February 2024. The theme this year across most committees was very much about AI and the use sustainable technologies.




Key stage 3 Art Club

NATIONAL Portrait Gallery








Our three year 10 GCSE Art groups visited the National Portrait gallery in London this term. This was in preparation for their up coming portrait unit.




