What is the EBacc?

The EBacc is a set of subjects at GCSE that keeps young people's options open for further study and future careers.

The EBacc is:

- English language and literature
- maths
- the sciences
- geography or history
- a language

- Secondary schools are measured on the number of pupils that take GCSEs in these core subjects. Schools are also measured on how well their pupils do in these subjects.
- The EBacc is made up of the subjects which are considered essential to many degrees and open up lots of doors.

Dos and Don'ts for choosing subjects

Do:

- Choose a variety of subjects
- Encourage your child to start thinking about your options right away!
- Encourage them to choose subjects that they enjoy and that are related to the type of job they would like to have or the further education they intend on doing.
- Encourage them to read the subject information carefully and make sure they really understand the subject courses they are choosing .
- If they have no definite career in mind choose subjects that they are good at.
- Remember that they may possibly change their mind regarding a career route before they leave school and that is ok!

Do not:

- Base their choices on what their friends choose.
- Think that they are not 'clever' enough to choose a particular subject.
- Choose a subject just because they like the teacher.



Year 9 Options: Key dates

- 1-to-1 guidance day with a member of staff to discuss choices Friday 24th January 2025.
- Year 9 parent/carer evening on the Thursday 30th January 2025.
- The window will open to all Year 9 pupils to start making their choices. Thursday 6th February 2025.
- Pupils will make their selections by Monday 24th February 2025 when the window closes.
- Allocated choices will go out on the Friday 4th April 2025.



Frequently Asked Questions



Why does my child have to choose one from each block? Why do they not have free choice?

- Expected to provide pupils with access to a wide range of learning, even at KS4
- Broad range of pathways available when they leave school
- Pupils may change their minds about certain subjects after having studied them for GCSE and this helps ensure they have more options for different pathways.

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How does my child make their choices?

1. Pupils choose one option from the first box, one option from the second box and one from the third box OR any other option that has not already been selected.
2. Pupils then repeat this process choosing a reserve option
3. Pupils then rank all choices from 1-6 (1 being their most preferred option) This is what helps us to determine which subjects are most important to pupils.

How are subjects allocated?

- Ensuring that pupils study a broad and balanced curriculum is a priority.
- This includes fulfilling the criteria of at least one subject from the 'Exploring the World' category and one from the 'Creative Expression' category.
- We will allocate as many first choices as possible. Where this is not possible, reserve choices will be allocated.
- We always do our best to ensure as many pupils get their first choices as possible. However, we cannot guarantee this will always be possible.
- Classes may be very popular, or the combination of subjects may clash.
- Please ensure your child submits reserve choices to ensure they have alternative options.
- We are an inclusive school which means we do not prioritise children based on ability.

Are subjects allocated on a first-come-first-served basis?

- No. Subjects are assigned at the end of the deadline and based on the best combinations of pupils getting as many first choices as possible.
- If their choices clash with each other, or a class becomes full they may be allocated their reserve choice subject.

Why do some pupils not receive their first choices?

- Some subjects are very popular and unfortunately our school only has the capacity to run the course with a certain class size.
- For example, there is only one Food Technology teacher at KS4 and only one specialised room that is equipped to run this course which limits the final number of pupils who can take this subject.

Are there waiting lists for subjects that are full?

- Yes. If you would like your child to be put on a waiting list please contact the options email and we will place them on the list. If a space becomes available we will let you know.



GCSE Options 2023-2024

- 1st choice in 2 subjects: 100%
- 1st choice in all 3 subjects: 84%
- Pupils were successfully allocated a first choice in 13 out of 17 subjects.



What is the difference between combined and triple science?

- Combined and triple science both cover Biology, Chemistry and Physics.
- Students will sit a total of six papers at the end of the GCSE in both course

Key Differences:

- The Combined pathway is worth two GCSE grade
- The triple pathway is worth three separate GCSE grades (Biology, Chemistry and Physics) and takes up one of your three GCSE choices
- The combined pathway has less content to cover than triple.
- In the combined pathway, students can only be entered for either Higher or Foundation.
- In the triple pathway, students can be entered for different tiers in each discipline. For example: A student may be entered for all higher in biology, chemistry and physics. They might be entered for higher in biology and physics but foundation in chemistry. In that sense triple science offers more flexibility
- Combined exams are 1 hr15 minutes long per paper
- Triple exams ate 1 hr 45 minutes long per paper



Requirements to be aware of for certain subjects

Requirements for P.E

Pupils considering PE should ensure they actively participate in sports outside of school or as part of a school team as they will need to reference these sports in their coursework.

Requirements for Music

Pupils considering Music should ensure they play an instrument or are able to sing.



Can my child take an extra GCSE?

Can my child take an extra GCSE in music?

If your child is fluent in a particular instrument we will support them in taking an additional GCSE. They should speak to Mr Kara and we can arrange for this exam to be taken.

Can my child take an extra GCSE in languages?

If your child is fluent in a language other than those offered in the options blocks we will support them in taking an additional GCSE. They should speak to Ms Sinclair and Ms Antonova and we can arrange for this exam to be taken.
